The Chesterfield Township Police Department is a full-service law enforcement agency that provides routine, emergency and investigative police services to its residents. Critical to this mission is the delivery of police services without favoritism or prejudice, being always mindful of the objectives of professional law enforcement.

The purpose of the report is to take a look at the events from the preceding year and present them to the residents and officials of Chesterfield Township. This report reflects the highlights for the year 2009. It contains personnel information, crime data, financial information and other events of importance. The report is intended to provide the residents of the Township a window into the Police Department so they can better understand the challenges and accomplishments of their department.

The Police Department is organized into three bureaus. The Administrative Bureau manages the staff and logistical support services. The Operations Bureau provides uniform patrol and emergency response services. The Detective Bureau handles criminal investigations. The department's 48 sworn officers and 12 civilians consistently deliver community policing services with pride, compassion, and professionalism. The men and women of the Department are ever vigilant in their patrol of the Township; preventing crime, ensuring the safe movement of traffic and providing many other services to its residents.

Included in this report is statistical data on calls for service, crimes reported, arrests made, tickets issued, internal complaints investigated and the use of force by all officers. Crime statistics are listed over a two year period so the data can be historically tracked.

The men and women of the Department strive to provide a professional police service in a cost effective manner. The Department's budget is carefully prepared and then submitted for review by the Finance Director, Township Supervisor and full Township Board. It is then presented to the

Township Residents for their review. The adopted 2009 budget provided for improvements in facilities and equipment. In spite of these expenditures, a surplus was returned to the Department fund balance to help ensure financial stability in challenging financial times.

Special recognition must be given to Lieutenant Dave Marker who took great effort to complete this project.

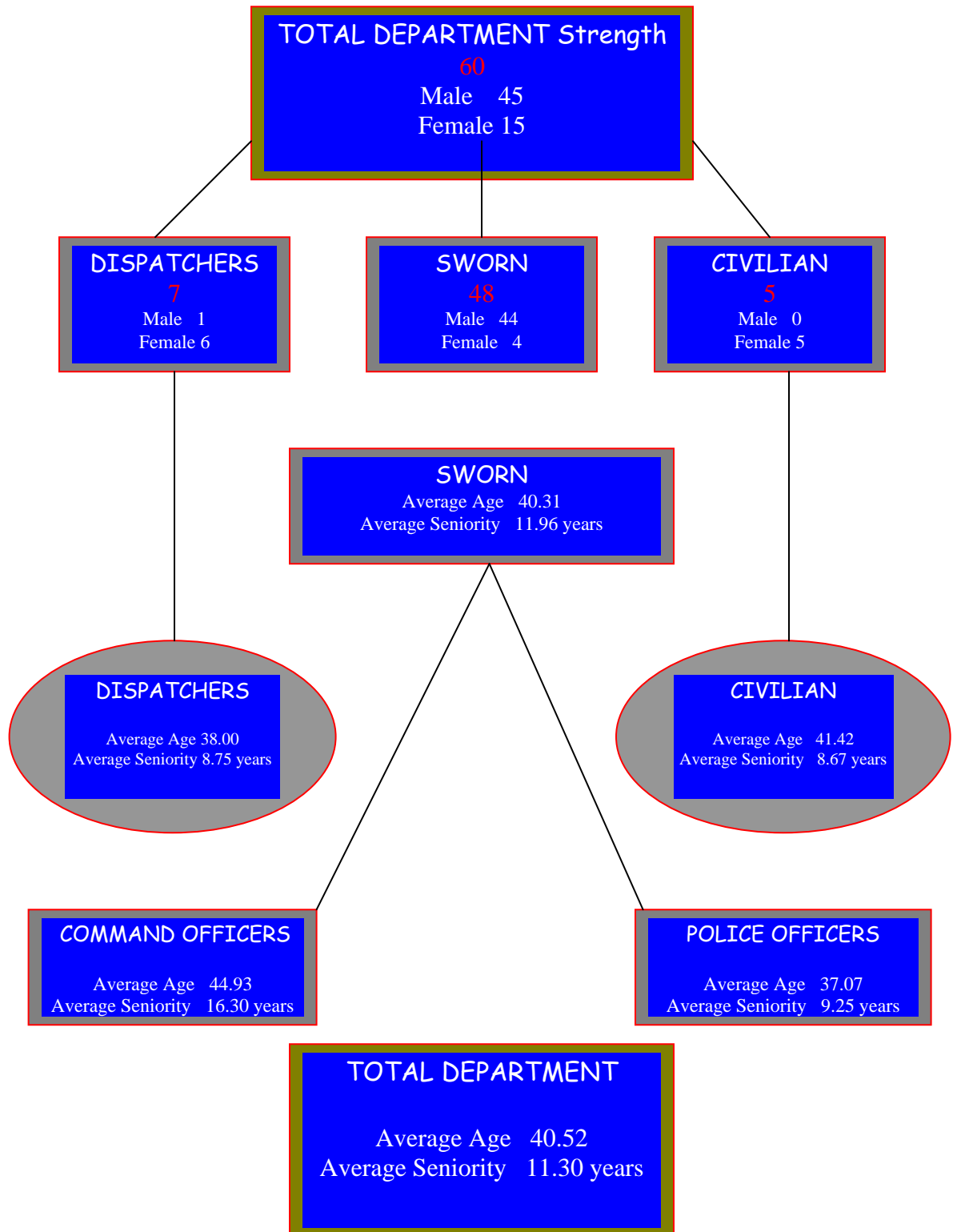

VIDEO ARRAIGNMENT SYSTEM

In July of 2009 the Department installed a video arraignment system linking the police department and the 42-2 District Court. The system allows for court proceedings to be conducted in a manner that protects the due process rights of all defendants by providing a clear, accurate visual and audio representation of all parties involved. In addition, the system enhances the safety of courtroom personnel, the general public and the police. It decreases the cost of transporting as well as the potential for escape by the arrested subject and frees up officers allowing them to remain on patrol duties.

Under the arraignment system, the offender appears before the Judge or magistrate via a computer monitor. The system also allows each party to verbally communicate with each other without the defendant ever leaving the secured cell block area in the police department.

In August of 2009 the Department purchased fifteen (15) Stag Arms AR-15 Model 2 rifles. The rifle was chosen because of its durability and is built to military-spec requirements. The Stag Arms AR 15 Model 2 rifle is widely used by SWAT teams around the world as well as by soldiers in the war on terror.

Sworn officer in the Department must go through a rigorous 3 day training course that includes move and shoot, threat identification and marksmanship. Training required officers to qualify at distances up to 100 yards.

Citation of Valor

On January 31, 2009, at 0052 hours, Officer Eric Meier responded to a domestic violence in progress radio call involving a knife. While officers were responding dispatch provided additional information that a male subject was attempting to lock himself in a bedroom and was threatening to commit suicide with the knife.

As Officer Eric Meier approached the residence he could hear arguing, screaming and yelling coming from inside the residence. Because of the immediate threat Officer Meier made the decision to enter the residence without back-up and without regard for his own safety. He was immediately confronted by a female that was screaming "he is cutting himself ... he is

going to kill himself". As Officer Meier reached the bedroom where the male subject was hold-up he observed him holding a large butcher knife to his throat. Officer Meier further observed a large deep laceration on the male's left side of his neck and uncontrollable bleeding coming from the deep wound. As the male continued to cut himself on the right side of his neck, Officer Meier ordered the subject to drop the knife and again without regard for his safety, Officer Meier transitioned from his duty weapon to his taser. As the male subject continued to cut deeply into his neck with the butcher knife Officer Meier fired his taser striking the subject. After falling to the floor the male continued to grab for the knife requiring Officer Meier to administer a second taser cycle which allowed him to secure the knife. The male, who was need of immediate medical attention, was provided first aid and conveyed to an area hospital.

Officer Meier's heroic actions under tremendous stress and without regard for his own safety prevented an unquestionable tragic ending and saved the life of the young man. Officer Meier's courageous actions are in keeping with a long tradition of the Chesterfield Township Police Department and are deserving of this award.

DISPATCH CENTER

The Chesterfield Township Police Dispatch Center provides state-of-the-art public safety dispatch service to the police and fire departments 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. A dispatch center is the nerve center to public safety. Dispatch services for police, fire and EMS are also provided to the City of New Baltimore on a contract basis. In 2009, the dispatch center handled 33,566 calls for service combined which was a decrease of 3% from 2008. The center has the most technologically advanced equipment and has a budget that allows for nine highly trained dispatchers that work 8 hour shifts. Dispatchers are required to make quick decisions; coordinate multiple calls at one time while being courteous, calm and professional. In addition, the dispatcher position requires common sense and the ability to maintain control of stressful situations.

K-9 UNIT

Two highly trained, nationally certified K-9 teams are comprised of one dog and a police officer handler and a specially equipped patrol vehicle. Dogs selected for K-9 duty are professionally bred

German Shepherds and must pass an extensive medical screening by a veterinarian prior to being accepted for the unit. In addition to patrol duties, K-9's are certified to track criminal suspects and lost persons, search buildings, locate evidence or lost property, detect narcotics or uncover explosives, handler protection, and suspect apprehensions.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

The Chesterfield Township Police Department Detective Bureau is responsible for the investigation of all incidents that require extended investigations beyond the initial report. Detectives assigned to this unit conduct various types of investigations ranging from misdemeanor crimes to serious felonies. Detectives also work closely as the liaison to other law enforcement

The Detective Bureau has a much needed interview room that is equipped with video equipment allowing Detectives to capture all interviews with suspects on a state of the art DVD recording system.

PATROL DIVISION

The patrol division is the foundation of the Department. The patrol division operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and 365 days a year with three overlapping shifts. Command officers work 12 hour shifts and patrol officers in the patrol division work 8 ½ hour shifts patrolling the 26 square miles of Chesterfield Township.



Afternoon Shift Briefing

In 2009, the patrol division responded to 23,941 calls for service. A "call for service" refers to any documented police activity which is classified as a crime, accident, complaint or a request for assistance. Those calls for service resulted in 1,136 total arrests.

EVIDENCE TECHNICIANS

The Department currently has a total of twelve (12) officers who are trained evidence technicians. The members of this unit have several responsibilities in addition to their road patrol duties. Their mission is to process crime scenes in an attempt to identify, document, and secure physical evidence. Evidence Technician duties include:

- Documenting a crime scene using photo and video depiction
- Collecting evidence to include fingerprints and footprints
- Properly collecting and recording physical evidence at a crime scene
- Preparing a well-organized set of field notes in preparation of a written report
- Submitting physical evidence for future forensic analysis

TRAFFIC UNIT

Two traffic units provide for the safe and efficient movement of pedestrian and vehicular traffic within the Township. Traffic units investigate accidents and identify accident causing violations; they provide speed enforcement on Township streets including residential neighborhoods, enforce motor carrier regulations and reconstruct serious injury or fatal accidents. The unit also focuses on seatbelt violations and concentrates their efforts in the fight against drunk drivers. In addition, regular patrol units also provide traffic enforcement. The unit also resolves neighborhood traffic complaints and problems as well as community education programs. They are also responsible with deploying the departments speed enforcement trailer to problem areas in the Township.

Currently the department has five (5) employees assigned to this unit. They maintain all case files and accident reports, process gun purchase permits, gun registrations, maintain the department's property room, deliver evidence to the crime lab and register sex offenders, in addition to providing secretarial services to the Office of the Chief of Police and the Detective Bureau. In 2009 the clerical staff was responsible for receiving and accounting for \$293,031.22 for a variety of services rendered which is an increase of 10 % over 2008 collections. Among their many duties the clerical staff fulfilled the following requests for citizens in 2009.

NOTE: The registered sex offenders count represents the number as of December 31. Sex offenders are required to register every 3 months with the Department to stay in compliance with the law. In addition, the Records Section registers sex offenders for the City of New Baltimore which is not reflected in the count listed above.

S.W.A.T. TEAM

The current Macomb County SWAT Team is composed of twenty-nine police officers from five different jurisdictions. Chesterfield Township Police Department, Shelby Township Police Department, Macomb County Sheriff Department, Utica Police Department, and Fraser Police. The Chesterfield Township Police currently has three members on the team, one sergeant and two officers. The team also has three tactical medics assigned that are from MedStar Ambulance Service. The twenty-nine members are divided into three tactical elements: sniper element, entry element, and containment element. In addition, the team has three members certified in explosive breaching, two armored vehicles and other transport vehicles

assigned. The SWAT Team trains twice a month. The training includes barricaded subject training, hostage rescue training, vehicle assault training, (passenger vehicles & busses) self contained breathing apparatus training, explosive breaching training, firearms qualification & training, hand to hand combat and fitness training.

In 2009, The Swat Team attended a month long training school that covered most aspects of S.W.A.T. training as it relates to response for Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) and Chemical, Biological Radiological, Nuclear Explosive (CBRNE) events. The training was held at the Public Service Training Center in Clinton Township. The training was provided by GTI, (Government Training Institute) based in South Carolina. As a result of this training, the Macomb County S.W.A.T. team has been federally certified as a level two capable S.W.A.T. Team. The federal rating system has to do with response capability. The largest difference between a level one S.W.A.T. team and a level two S.W.A.T. team is that a level one S.W.A.T. team is full time team, meaning their primary day to day assignment is S.W.A.T. This type of rating will avail the Macomb County S.W.A.T. team to additional federal funding that has been pulled back from local response teams as they do not meet the response criteria set by the federal government for continued funding. The Macomb County S.W.A.T. team is currently the only team regionally that meets the level two criteria.



In the year 2009, the Macomb County Sheriff S.W.A.T. Team received three calls for service. This is a significant decline in our calls for service. This has been a nationwide trend. Nationwide deployments of tactical teams have showed a slight decrease, but when activated the type of calls have had a larger and more serious nature. As an example, a workplace or school active shooter, compared to a hostage situation involving estranged family members

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

The administrative division of the Chesterfield Township Police Department consists of the Chief of Police who is responsible for the overall operation and staff of the police department. There are two (2) lieutenants who oversee the operations division and the administrative division and one (1) Sergeant who is responsible for dispatch, records, vehicle maintenance and an extensive computer network.

In 2009 the department received sixty (60) personnel complaints, an decrease of 18% over 2008. Personnel complaints generally arise out of complaints from outside the department against the performance of individual employees and/or department policy. In all cases the allegations were thoroughly investigated with the following results.

Improper Conduct - The accused employee committed an act of misconduct.

Proper Conduct - The alleged act occurred but was justified, legal and Proper.

Inconclusive - The allegations could not be clearly proven or disproved.

Still Under Investigation - Investigation not completed yet.

CRIME DATA

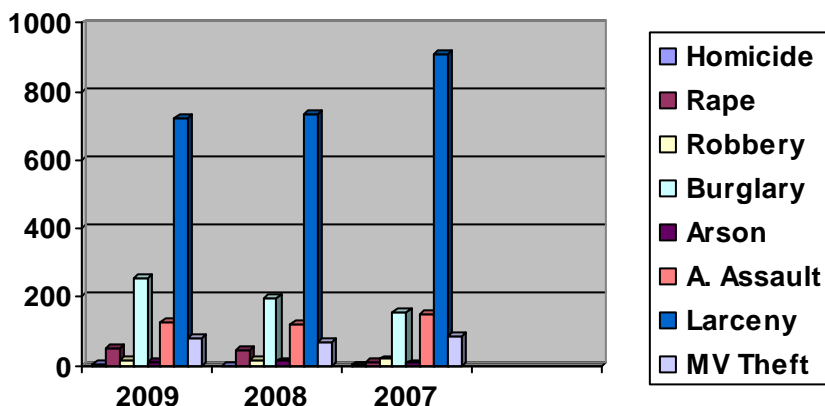
Crimes are indexed by the FBI into two separate groups commonly referred to as Part I and Part II crimes. Part I crimes include the following:

- homicide
- rape
- robbery
- burglary
- arson
- aggravated assault
- larceny
- motor vehicle theft

Each year the FBI compiles statistical data for the entire country and releases reports called the Uniform Crime Report. Usually, when the news media talk about crime rates going up or down, they are referring to Part I Crimes.

ALCOHOL/TOBACCO COMPLIANCE

In 2009, the Chesterfield Township Police Department conducted a decoy operation on every Class C and every SDD/SDM licensed establishment in the community. The Township currently has twenty five (25) Class C locations which are generally bars and restaurants and thirty (30) SDD/SDM licensed locations, which are generally party stores. The goal of this operation was to identify Township merchants that fail to comply with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission regulations and to protect the community from issues that arise from underage alcohol consumption. The decoy operation resulted in seven (7) locations, three (3) Class C businesses and four (4) SDD/SDM locations, being cited for sale of alcohol to a minor. In all seven (7) incidents violation reports were submitted to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission for prosecution.

Annually the Chesterfield Township Police, in partnership with area high schools, visit area businesses within the Township in an effort to make them aware of tobacco sales to underage citizens. During the visit merchants were provided signage to post in their establishments.

IMPOUNDED/TOWING VEHICLES

The police department impounds and/or towed vehicles for abandonment, driving under the influence (DUI), improper or expired license plate, crime investigations, accidents and other offenses such as drug-related crimes. In 2008 the department recorded the following:

During the 2008 calendar year there were 956 impounded vehicles released resulting in \$13,860 in fees for the department. In addition, the department realized \$13,368.75 by auctioning eleven (11) retired police vehicles, drug and DUI forfeited vehicles.

Township Board approved the purchase of a digital recording system for recording interviews in criminal investigations. The system was paid for with grant funds.

Township Board approved the purchase of a fuming hood for finger print recovery. The fuming hood was paid for with grant funds.

Township Board approved the purchase of seven (7) front and rear L3 video systems and ten (10) rear only cameras for patrol vehicles. The cameras were paid for with grant funds.

- September 8: Township Board approved the purchase of nineteen (19) modems for patrol vehicles. The modems were paid for with grant funds.

Township Board approved the department's request to award bid for installation of patrol vehicle equipment.

- October 5: Township Board approved advertising, testing and creation of an eligibility for the position of dispatch.

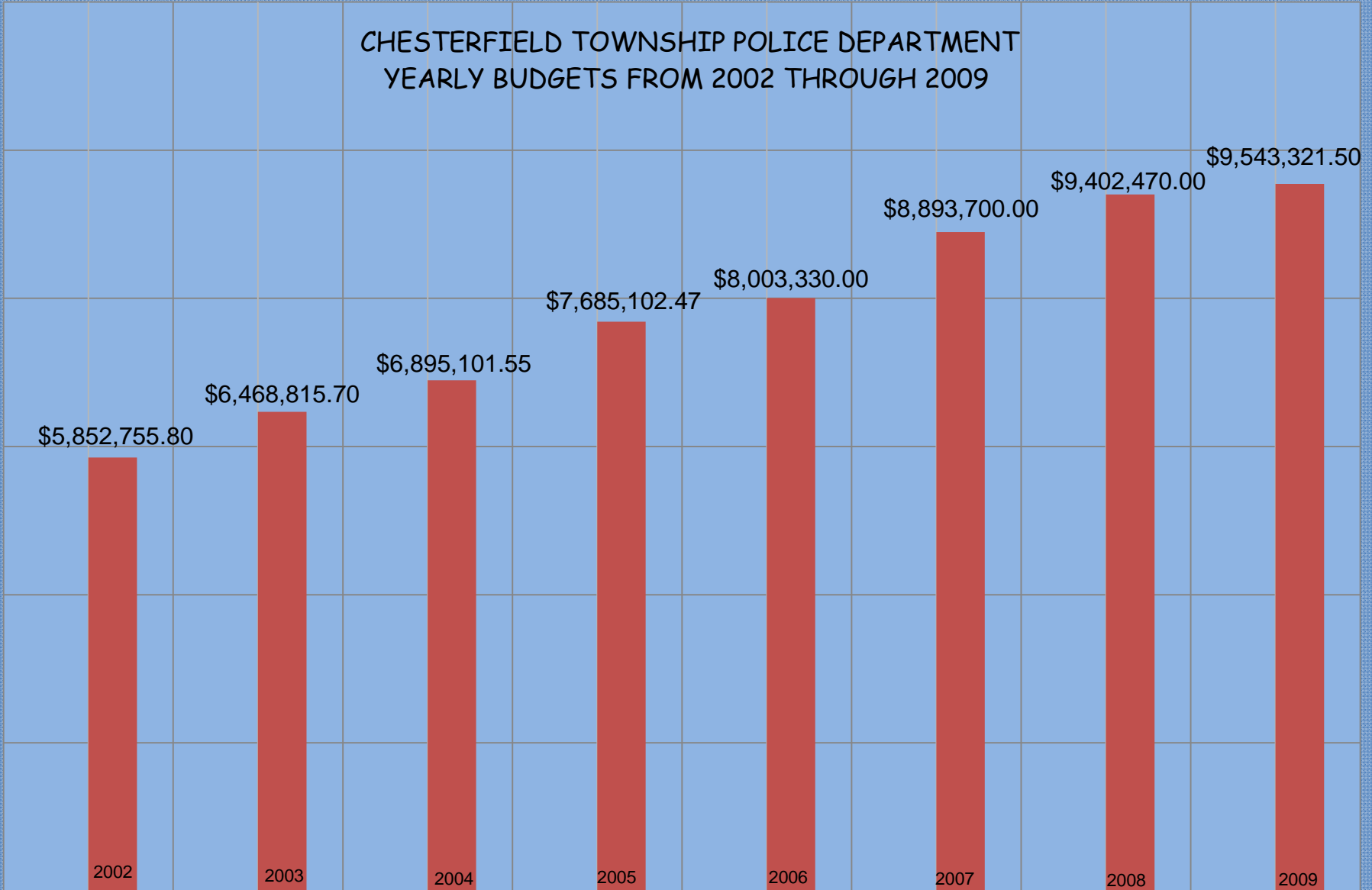
Township Board approved the Department's request to renew annual maintenance agreement for the Department telephone and radio recording systems.
